A workshop by Bro. Sunil Britto

A unique gathering of the sisters under the age of 50 took place from 8th to 12th July, 2022, at St. Mary's Region House. This was the second of this kind of gathering in the annals of Nepal Region's History. Fifteen members under this category came together under the guidance of



Bro. Sunil Britto, a Christian Brother. The main thrust of the entire programme was Community Life, Diversity and Personal Growth.

Bro. Sunil had quite many innovative ways of making the group at home with the meeting. He began with an ice breaking game, "Fire on the Mountain, Run... Run..." and gave us a buddy to closely journey with, in the coming days. The buddies sat together for all the five days' sessions!

On the first day itself, Bro. Sunil introduced the theme, 'community life'. Talking



about relationship he showed a meaningful portrait of three figures dancing together and also a video of Ballet, Hand in Hand, performed by Ma Li and Zhai Xiaowei, the pair who won the silver medal during the fourth CCTV Dance Competition. Both the contesters were differently abled: while one had no leg, the other had no hands. The synchronized movements depicted the process of becoming the other one's hands and legs and the dance was very inspiring. Brother also spoke of UBUNTU, an African story, with the message, 'I can be happy only when others are happy'. We are all inter-beings and we have to live in a syn-

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odal world.

All the next sessions were connected to MBTI. The notes were given to every participant regarding MBTI and Non-violent Communication. The topic on Non-Violent communication was touched several times when Bro. Sunil spoke of relationships and community life.

A couple of sessions were set apart for talking openly what one feels in the group. It was focusing on healing relationships. Most of the evening sessions were combined with creative and symbolic prayers and reflections.

Every opportunity offers delight to the recipient, and the sisters under the age of 50 experienced joy in the five days of renewal program as they celebrated their gifts, diversity, and connectedness. Special thanks to Sr. Jessy, our Regional Superior, for organizing such an enriching workshop. Thank you dear Bro.
